Charles de Secondat, baron de Montesquieu, better known as simply Montesquieu, was a French writer and philosopher who is most famous for his 1721 novel Persian Letters and his 1748 essay The Spirit of Laws, in which he developed a number of ideas that form the basis of our democracies even today. He was a key figure in the Enlightenment movement, and advocated the values of tolerance, liberty and equality in both his fiction and non-fiction writings.

He published The Persian Letters anonymously because he feared that his criticisms of the recently deceased Louis XIV might get him into trouble with government officials.
